Pratham books endeavours to create stories that reflect evolving realities, present ways for children to navigate the world, and offer tools to understand the natural world and the environment.

When it comes to the climate crisis, research has shown that events exacerbated by the global phenomenon render children most vulnerable. This is particularly troubling for a developing nation like India that has a population of more than 448 million boys and girls under the age of 18.

According to a recent study, a child born in 2021 will experience, across their lifetime, an average of more than twice as many wildfires, droughts, river floods, crop failures, and heatwaves as compared to their grandparents.



Children deserve to know the truth about their future — clouded by the uncertainty of climate change. Picture books give them this truth, but also the imagination to build a different, better, future for themselves.

- 1. Understand the complexities of climate change while navigating their own realities
- 2. Foster a connection between their immediate environment and the global one, fostering respect for nature
- 3. Develop critical analysis skills and synthesise information about the world they live in
- 4. Open their minds to deeper avenues of thought and reinforce learning in social and natural science
- 5. Confer appreciation for the role they play in their environment both their physical, changing environment and their civic environments.




UNDERWATER TALES OF WONDER


Our stories take a dive into the underwater world, an oft-overlooked space in children's literature in India, but one that holds a deep fascination for children.




Take a peek into a coral reef teeming with life.



A story centred around how different creatures move in the water.




A book that touches upon bioluminescence.





Examine the symbiotic relationship between a goby fish and a pistol shrimp.

CREATURES AND MORE




THE THREAT OF CHANGING CLIMATES

Books can be a great conversation starter in the classroom, and are fabulous supplementary reading material for the curriculum.




An epistolary book that explores the impact of climate events on various species and habitats through a series of letters, presenting a pressing reality.




A tale on remembering what old homes looked like and what the new ones could look like for climate refugees who have been displaced by unpredictable climate events.


